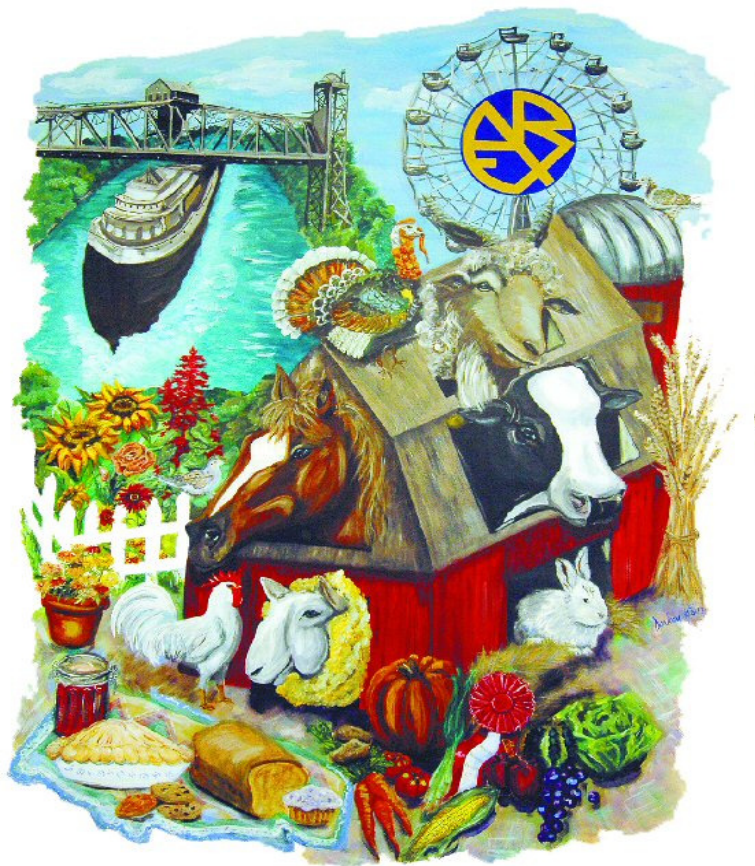

NIAGARA REGIONAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

The Niagara Regional Exhibition is owned and operated by the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society.

This Society was founded in 1853 by Provincial Charter. It was called the Welland County Agricultural Society and operated the Welland Fair. On January 30, 1970 the name of the fair was changed to Niagara Regional Exhibition and on January 22, 1971 the name of the Society was changed to Niagara regional Agriculture Society. The objectives of the Society are to encourage interest, promote improvements in and advance the standards of agriculture, domestic industry and rural life.

Every person is entitled to be a member of the Society, but no person under eighteen years of age is eligible to vote at any meeting of the Society or to hold office in the Society.

The business of the Society is carried on by eighteen senior directors and six junior directors (not over twenty-six years of age). They all serve without remuneration of any kind in the interest of this community. Anyone interested in the fun and fellowship of operating a large fair with its multitudes of activities should contact a director and ask to serve on the committee.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Each exhibitor must be a member of the Society. Membership fees: Senior \$5.00; Junior (22 years of age and under) \$5.00. Membership fees are not refundable. Junior Membership allows you to exhibit in the Junior and 4-H Shows only. Senior membership is required for all other shows.
2. Each Senior Membership will receive a *1-time pass* allowing free admittance ONCE during the NRE. Each Junior Membership allows one free admission each day of the NRE.
3. The prize money cheques will be mailed early in November and must be cashed immediately when they are received. In the event of an error in the cheque, a second cheque will be issued if necessary. The fiscal year of the Society now ends November 30. Due to government requirements, all cheques not cashed by November 20 this year will be null and void.
4. The sum of \$5.00 shall be retained from every member obtaining the sum of \$10.00 or over in prize money to cover membership for the following year.
5. Except where stated otherwise, there will be deductions of 10% of all prize monies in lieu of an entry fee.
6. All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. Any person showing anything for competition not his or her own shall forfeit prize money.
7. It shall be the duty of the judges only to award such premiums as they consider the exhibit entitled to. They may withhold the prize from any exhibit improperly classed or not worthy of a prize.

8. All exhibits receiving a premium must have an entry tag attached and, unless otherwise exempted, must remain until the close of the show. Prize money will be forfeited if this rule is violated.
9. All exhibits shall be at risk of the exhibitor.
10. All protest must be made in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the Secretary on the day of cause of protest accompanied by \$1.00 which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
11. Prizes will be awarded as shown in the Judge's Book and no alteration can be made. Exhibits not entered on the entry form cannot be awarded prize money.
12. Specific regulations applying to each class of exhibit are given under each show. Please refer to index.
13. Any exhibitor or attendant who is guilty of creating a disturbance, whether by openly criticizing the judge or using obscene language to any judge or officer, shall therefore forfeit the right to any premium and may be suspended by the Society from exhibiting.
14. Prize list is subject to correction of typographical errors and omissions. In the case of a disagreement, the ruling of the committee chairman shall be final.
15. In the event of rain or inclement weather so effecting the gate receipts as to leave the holding of the Fair a financial loss after the Government Rain Insurance has been taken into account, the Society reserves the right to pay all premiums, awards of purses at a rate on the dollar sufficient to make good the loss.

16. Section 19 (2) of the Agricultural Societies Act preventing certain performances, huckstering or trafficking in merchandise etc., within three hundred yards of the fairgrounds on the days of Exhibition shall be enforced.
17. If not three exhibitors in livestock classes, the Fair Board will only pay half the prize money.

RULES

1. Note - Entries close at September 5th or postmarked September 5th. Entries will not be accepted after this date. The Society reserves the right to limit the entries to the capacity of the facilities for each show.
2. For Dairy and Beef, 3 exhibits and 24 animals.
3. Note - The new Show Ring Ethics are now in effect at Niagara Regional Exhibition and allow the preparations of hooves, hair and horns only (the rest of the animal to be in its natural state), and the use of natural feed for any animal - except a bull may be tranquillized if necessary. No other treatment of any kind will be permitted without the consent of the Cattle Committees.

4. Exhibitors on D.H.I.A. may calculate their equivalent B.C.A.% from their D.H.I.A. records. The D.H.I.A. records must be available at ring side.
5. Animals shall be registered in the name of the exhibitor prior to show date. Registration certificates shall be available at the show and shall be checked before judging commences.
6. See General Rules and Regulations which apply to this show.
7. Two changes of animals may be made in your entry form up to 12:00 noon of show day for all breeds and the interbreed udder; advise the Show Chairman. You are required to record these changes on your entry form in the office before leaving the grounds. The maximum number of entries in the entry form shall be the number of single animals allowed in the prize money section of the show plus two and the Breeder's Herd and Best Udder.
8. Entry fee - 20% of prize money won will be deducted for all classes.
9. All animals entered in groups must be entered in regular classes.
10. Health Requirements are as follows:
All animals must be free of Mange, Ringworm and Pink Eye. Animals showing evidence of active ringworm infection will not be admitted to the show. Exhibitors should have their cattle inoculated for protection against shipping fever. All exhibitors must produce a Federal Government Brucellosis negative test certificate for each animal before unloading. The certificate must be dated within 60 days of the show date. Bulls under 6 months of age are exempt.
11. Exhibitors are not required to list names and number of animals comprising a herd or group exhibit but must provide such information to the Chairman before judging starts.

12. All cattle must be on grounds at 11:00 a.m. of the day they are to be shown.
 13. Cattle may be removed after judging is completed. For previous removal prize money will be forfeited.
 14. Exhibitors must furnish feed. First bedding for livestock is provided but extra straw will be provided at cost.
 15. Number of entries per class:
Only one entry per class is eligible from a breeding unit, except the Fair may authorize, in up to two classes, a maximum of two entries in Jr. and Sr. Yearling Heifer Calf, or any Bull Class, and maximum of three entries in 2 year old, 3 year old, 4 year old, 5 year old or Dry Cow. Maximum total eligible entries from a breeding unit is 10 head.
Note - All cattle, whether owned by one person, or more than one person (individually or jointly), which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are to be considered to be the product of one farm or breeding unit, and only one individual may enter the product of one farm or breeding unit. Where the same or common interest are involved in more than one breeding unit, such operations are considered as one breeding unit.

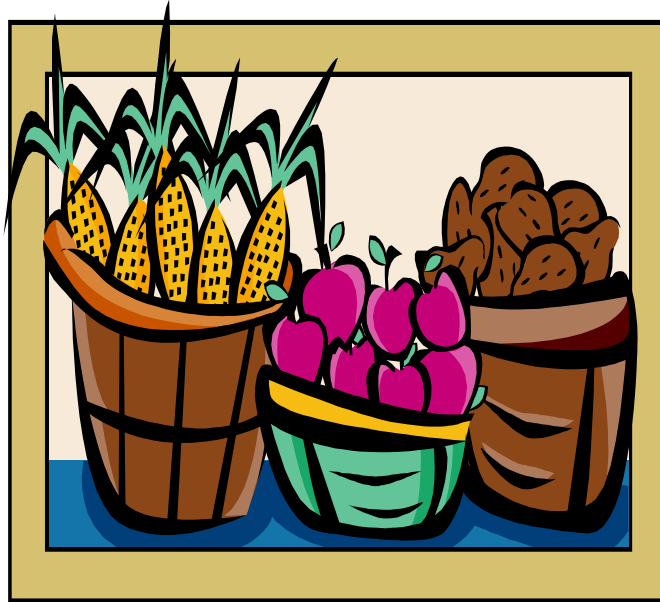

A \$500.00 Grand Prize as well as a certificate and ribbon will be awarded to the exhibitor of the winning quilt, who will retain ownership of the quilt.

QUILT JUDGING STANDARDS

SCORE FOR QUILTS:

- 15 ~ General Appearance
- 40 ~ Design, Colour, and Materials
- 45 ~ Workmanship

GENERAL APPEARANCE

- Attracts attention, outstanding colour, design, etc.
- Neat, clean, no chalk or pencil marks
- No rippling edges
- No basting threads or knots showing on front or back
- Backing smooth and free from wrinkles

DESIGN

- A new design or an original adaptation of an old one as opposed to a traditional adaptation of an old design
- Any interesting combinations of large and small, light and dark
- Design of quilting suitable to design of quilt, ie: geometric quilting design compliments geometric piecing design
- Scale and proportion of pieces and shapes relate to each other and to size of quilt
- One focal point, or eye travels around within quilt and not over the edge
- Scallops, picots, or additional features compliment design of quilt and quilting

COLOUR

- Attractive combinations
- Top and back harmonize
- Prints and solids used in pleasing relationships

MATERIALS

OUTER FABRIC:

- Good quality, uniform quality
- Colourfast and durable to warrant time and expense of making it
- No variation in colour between pieces of same fabric
- If necessary, will stand washing and hard use

THREAD:

- Durable
- Suitable colour

FILLING:

- Smooth and evenly distributed
- Suitable weight for article
- Should launder well

WORKMANSHIP

QUILTING:

- Single thread used
- Stitches uniform and evenly spaced on both front and back
- Minimum quilting on construction lines
- Quilting lines no more than 2.5 cm or 1 inch apart if filling is cotton or wool and no more than 10 cm or 4 inches apart if polyester
- If pieced or appliqued, more quilting than “stitching in the ditch” needed to give texture

BORDERS:

- Straight and even
- If pieced, seams inconspicuous and balanced

BINDING:

- Square corner mitred
- Wide bindings padded to the edge
- Dark, better than light (doesn't show dirt and acts as a frame)
- Bias, sewn on top by machine and on back by hand with small, even invisible stitches
- If part of backing, brought to front, hand hem with small invisible, even stitches
- An acceptable but less preferred method, top and backing are turned toward each other and hand hemmed

PIECED:

- May be jointed by machine but no machine stitching should show
- Points and corners meet
- Accurate piecing
- Patterns on adjoining blocks line up
- Blocks line up accurately with each other

WHOLE CLOTH:

- If fabric is joined, two seams are at edges of bed rather than one in centre

APPLIQUED:

- Raw edge of applique turned under and stitched
- Hand applique stitches small and invisible (may be hemming or blind hemming)
- Embroidery stitches may be used for decoration only
- Machine applique stitches even and close together with no raw edge of applique showing beyond machine stitching
- Grain of applique matches grain of background when possible
- No shadow of applique seam allowances showing against background

EMBROIDERED:

- Attractive colour combination of threads and fabrics
- Embroidered design and quilting design co-ordinate
- Stitches neat and accurate
- No transfer lines visible
- No knots or carry-over (float) threads visible

GLOSSARY

Comforter:	Has a thicker filling than a quilt and may be hand or machine quilted
Appliqued:	A design on top made by applying pieces of fabric to another background fabric together with hand or sometimes with machine stitching
Embroidered:	Has quilting and embroidery as principal decorations
Pieced:	Design on top made by joining pieces of fabric together with hand or machine seams
Pieced and Appliqued:	Design is pieced, then appliqued to quilt
Whole Cloth:	Principal decoration is created by the quilting stitch itself on a plain background

HORTICULTURE SHOW

RULES

1. Entries accepted 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Wednesday of Fair Week. No entries accepted after this time. All entries must be recorded on the entry form to receive any prize money awarded. Make a copy of the entry form for your records.
2. See General Rules and Regulations, which apply to this Show.
3. Exhibits may be removed after the Fair, Sunday between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. and Monday 9:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. To remove exhibits at other times, special arrangements may be made with the Chairman. Prize money will be forfeited for prior removal of exhibits.
4. The Society will not be responsible for any exhibits. Exhibitors are requested to put their name, address, and phone number on the bottom of each container.
5. Exhibitors must complete their own exhibit tags; available at the office on entry day. An exhibit tag must be attached to each entry before being placed in the Show.
6. Exhibitors may only place one entry in each class.
7. Potted plants must have been in the entrant's care at least three months. These will be watered by the Committee. All Cut Specimens and Collections must have been grown by the entrant. Cut specimens will benefit greatly by having a long drink of water ahead of their preparation.
8. In the Design division, flowers may come from any source.
9. The standards for judging will be in accordance with "Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design, 2003 Edition."

HORTICULTURE SHOW

DEFINITIONS

1. **Bloom-** Individual flower, one to a stem, specimen blooms should be disbudded
2. **Bud-** Undeveloped growing point which may become a shoot, leaf or flower
3. **Collection-** A specified number of cut flowers, potted plants, branches, fruits, vegetables and/ or nuts, exhibited for cultural perfection.
4. **Container-** Any receptacle for plant material. In design classes, it is an integral part of the design.
5. **Exhibit-** An entry placed in a show either for competition or display. Once an entry has been placed it becomes an exhibit.
6. **Spike-** An upright stem carrying several flowers which are nearly stem-less, e.g. gladiolus.
- 7- **Spray-** A spray is the terminal flowering growth of an herbaceous or woody plant carried on one stem. Ideally it would show all forms, e.g. flower in bloom, buds showing colour, green buds and leaves.
8. **Stem or Stalk-** A main plant structure which supports flowers, buds, leaves or fruit.
9. **Uniformity-** All specimens in an exhibit should be as nearly alike as possible in size, form and colour. (All specimens should be at the same stage of development.)
10. **Pot-et-Fleur-** An exhibit of growing plants, in or out of pots, packed tightly with moisture-retaining material, plus cut flowers in tubes or water, oasis or other material, all assembled in one container. Moss, decorative wood and rock may be included. No cut foliage is permitted. However, cut flowering and/ or fruited branches may be used.
